Advocacy support, in plain language

Vizy Advocate helps you understand notes and reports, prepare for meetings, know your rights, and take action for your child. Ask anything in plain words, or start from one of six starting points:

New to This: Just diagnosed? "Where do I start?" "What is an IEP?"

Something Feels Wrong: "My child is struggling and no one is helping."

Understand: Progress reports and therapy notes, decoded.

Prepare: IEP meeting prep and parent concern statements.

Know Your Rights: IEP rights, Prior Written Notice, what to ask.

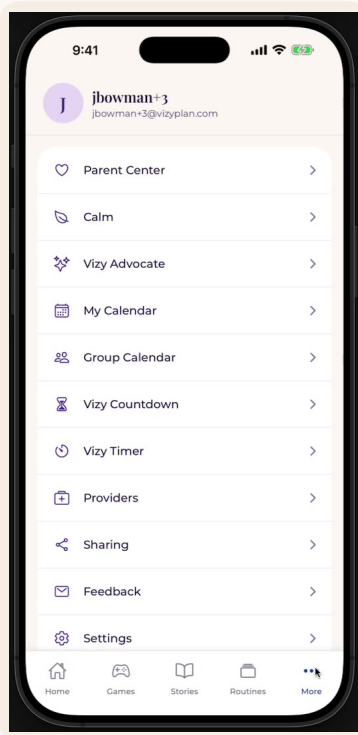
Take Action: Letters to the school, appeals, next-meeting questions.

STEP 1

Find Vizio Advocate

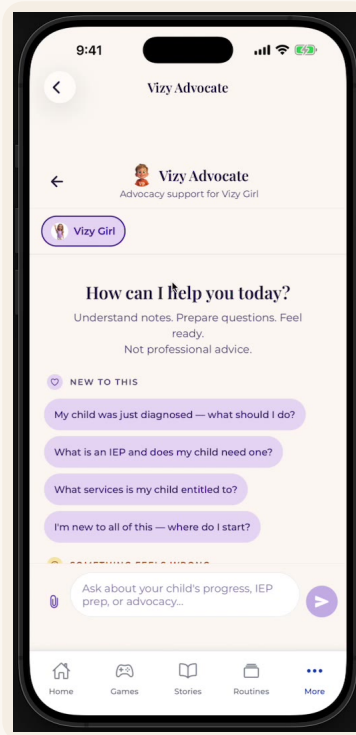
- 1 From the More tab: tap More in the bottom bar, then "Vizio Advocate."
- 2 Or from Home: tap the Vizio Boy button and choose "Advocate."
- 3 You land on "How can I help you today?" — tap any starting point, or type your own question at the bottom.



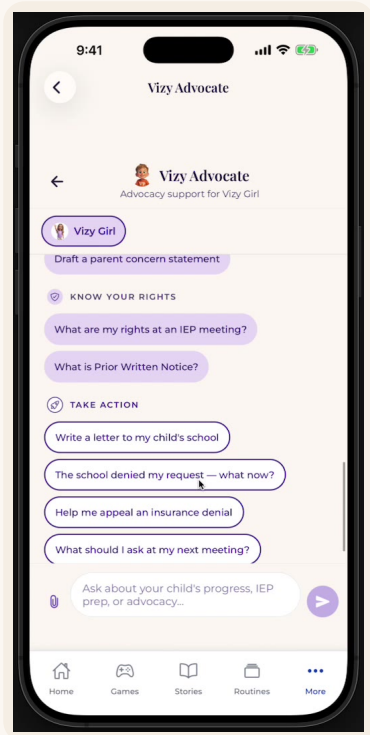
1 · More menu → Vizio Advocate

3 · Tap a starting point or type

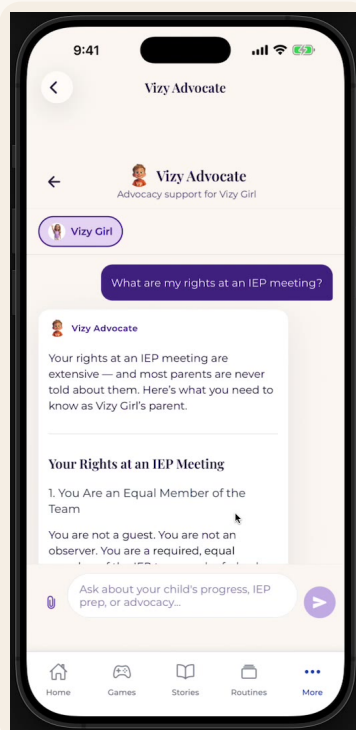


More starting points as you scroll

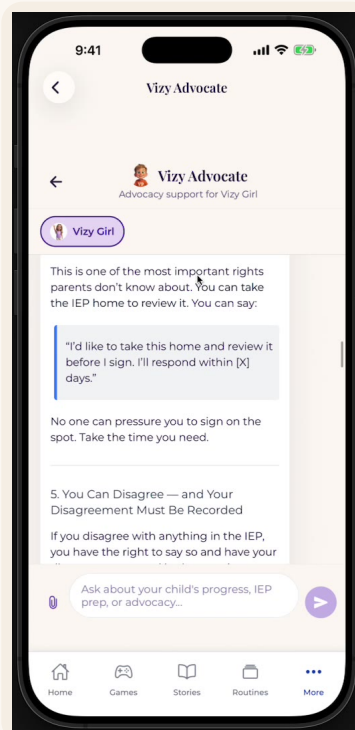
STEP 2

Ask — and get an answer you can use

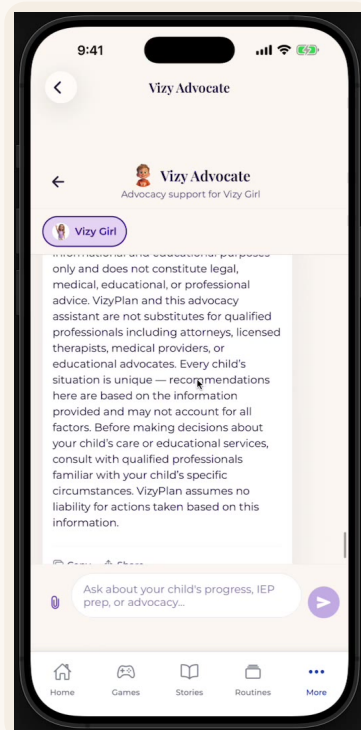
- 1 Tap a question like "What are my rights at an IEP meeting?"
- 2 Vizzy Advocate answers in numbered, plain-language points — including the rights most parents are never told about.
- 3 Answers include exact phrases you can say or write ("I'm requesting Prior Written Notice of your refusal...") and questions to ask at your next meeting.
- 4 Tap Copy or Share at the end of any answer to paste it into an email or bring it to a meeting.

3 · Scripts you can say word-for-word

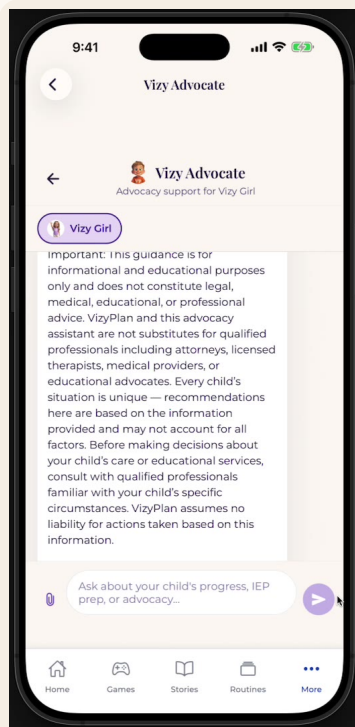


4 · Copy or Share any answer

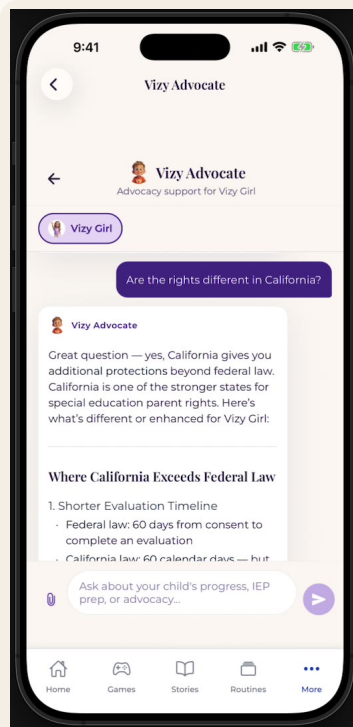
STEP 3

Ask follow-ups — and make it about YOUR state

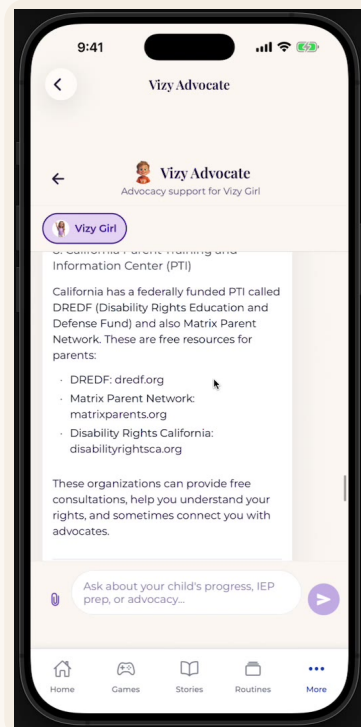
- 1 Keep the conversation going: type a follow-up like "Are the rights different in California?"
- 2 Vizzy Advocate explains what your state adds on top of federal law — timelines, complaint processes, meeting-recording rules, and what stays the same.
- 3 Answers also point you to real parent organizations in your state for free consultations and advocates.

Getting the most from Vizu Advocate

Use it BEFORE the meeting.

Ten minutes with "Help me prepare for an IEP meeting" turns a stressful hour into one where you know your rights and your questions.

Name your state.

Rights and timelines vary by state. Adding "in Massachusetts" or "in Arizona" gets you the rules that actually apply to you.

Use the scripts as written.

Phrases like "I'm requesting Prior Written Notice" carry legal weight schools respond to. Copy them word for word.

Paste it where you need it.

Copy any answer into an email to the school, your notes, or a message to your co-parent or advocate.

It supports you — it is not a lawyer.
